Message from our Principal – Mr Huntington

Dear Parents and Carers.

In September we launched our new school values of Respectful, Ambitious, Resilient. If our students and staff can live these values every day, Smith's Wood will continue its rapid journey of school improvement from its position when I joined in March 2023. I am proud of the staff who have been working tirelessly to improve the quality of education which your child receives, and this community deserves. This has been reflected in the recent FMAT review which was followed by our first Ofsted monitoring visit. We received some very positive feedback from the Ofsted inspectors which acknowledged the progress that the school has made in a relatively short space of time. I look forward to sharing more details from this monitoring visit when we receive the official report.

We have had a strong push on punctuality and uniform this half term. Our gates open at 8.15am and students are expected to be in school at their tutor group line up by 8.30am. This allows for a positive and productive start to the day as students meet as a year group to receive any notices from their achievement leader before heading into their form room to begin their tutor activity. I am excited to see the impact of the tutor time reading programme which will begin after half term. Reading is such a crucial skill for all students. It allows them to access the curriculum and be successful at school and in life. Please do talk to your child about the books they are reading and encourage a love of reading. Your child will reap the rewards of this.

I am proud to see how smart many of our students look when they arrive at school every morning. They will be greeted at the gates with a warm and welcoming smile from several staff we have at the gates who will also check that all students are in the correct unform. When walking around school and dropping into lessons I am delighted to see the high-quality learning taking place in a variety of classrooms. To ensure your child can learn effectively in a safe environment we have a behaviour system which rewards students who live our values of being respectful, ambitious and resilient, whilst aims to correct the behaviour of students who may be making poor choices. Please can I remind parents, carers and students that they can use the toilets before school, during breaktime and at lunch. Students should not be leaving lessons to go to the toilet during their lessons unless there is a medical reason to do so. To ensure students are giving themselves the best possible chance of being successful we need them to be in their lesson in front of their expert teacher every minute of every period of the day.

A huge well done to the many students who have taken part in house competitions and also attended our extracurricular clubs. A strong set of GCSEs is important for a student, but as a school we also want your child to enjoy all aspects of school life. Part of this comes through getting involved with the opportunities outside of the classroom which we offer.

Have a safe and restful half term break. We thank you for your continued support in ensuring that Smith's Wood continues its journey of rapid improvement.

Attendance Focus

It is vitally important that all students have excellent attendance at school. Research indicates that even a few days of absence can impact negatively on students' performance. At Smith's Wood Academy, we are committed to working with students and parents/carers to achieve the school attendance target of **96**%. Your support in ensuring your child comes to school every day, demonstrating excellent punctuality is vitally important.

Attendance Expectations

- · School is open from 8:15am in the morning and students can access the canteen and outside areas from that time.
- Students will begin line-up at 8:30am. The entrance gate will be locked at this time, students arriving after 8.30am will be marked as late, which will result in a detention.
- School will contact home if a child is not in school. This will be in the form of an MCAS message and potentially also a call to ascertain the reason for absence. The school's expectation is that parents/carers support the school by notifying us daily of any absence prior to 8:30am.
- · We advise parents/carers to not take their children on holiday during term time and these requests to do so will not be authorised. Any requests should be made in advance and could result in a Penalty Notice from the local authority. There are 175 non-school days per year in which to book Holidays, appointments and shopping days.


KS3: Reading Novels



The benefits of reading Literature are well known: it increases student's vocabulary, comprehension and their understanding of the world around us. In English lessons we are committed to ensuring all KS3 classes read at least two full novels per year. See the books that students will be reading this year below:

<u>Year 7:</u>

'Ghost Boys' – a tale of a 12 year old African-American child who falls victim to police brutality.

'Terror Kid' – a story about a young man who is tricked into committing a terrible crime – based right here in Birmingham.






Year 8:

'Heroes' – A story about a war hero who has a sinister secret; a tale of revenge and guilt.

'The Hunger Games' – a dystopian thriller where young people are used as violent entertainment. Katniss is our reluctant hero determined to save her sister. The first of three novels that we hope our students will want to continue reading in their own time.









<u>Year 9:</u>

'Coram Boy' – A story that follows an orphan and his best friend; set in the brutal world of 18th C England when children were often treated poorly. This is a sad tale of triumph over evil.

'To Kill a Mockingbird' – a classic American novel based on a coming-of-age story with themes of antiracism set during the Great Depression.
