Message from our Principal – Mr Huntington

Dear Parents and Carers,

Although it has been a short term with regards the number of school days, there has still been lots going on and plenty to celebrate. We had our first drop down day of the year. Some of the highlights were JCB coming in to work with our Year 8 students as part of their school challenge programme. This resulted in a number of our students being asked to represent Smith's Wood at the National Final in Doncaster. Year 9 spent the day at local colleges to look at the opportunities available to them post Year 11. This coincided with Year 9 starting their Pathways process which has seen them select their KS4 qualifications.

Year 11 will start their GCSE exams during next half term. Whilst their first exam is getting closer, there is still much they can do to ensure they are fully prepared to do their very best across all of their subjects. We are offering a range of intervention sessions across the Easter period. I hope that all of those students invited to the sessions are able to attend as I have no doubt the effort and revision they put in over the next couple of months can have a major positive impact on the rest of their lives.

I am pleased to see that lots of students continue to attend our extra-curricular programme. Whilst exam results are extremely important, we are also keen that our students have a range of opportunities to continue to grow and develop outside of the classroom. Our extra-curricular offer has been enhanced further by the introduction of the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. This is something that has created a lot of interest amongst our students. I look forward to seeing students working hard towards achieving their bronze award in this programme in the near future.

Attendance at Smith's Wood continues to improve. As a whole school our attendance is 5% higher than it was than last year. Despite this improvement, we must continue to work hard in this area. We know that the higher a student's attendance is the more likely they are to be successful. Please continue to support us by ensuring your child attends school every day.

I am pleased to inform you that we have been able to recruit a number of high-quality teaching staff across a range of subjects. Some of these staff will join us next term, others will join us in September. As we welcome new staff, unfortunately we are saying goodbye to some current staff. Ms Abdi and Mr Martin will be moving on to their new schools after Easter. We wish them well and thank them for their hard work.




World Book Day







Sparx Maths

This term saw the launch of Sparx Maths. It has been fantastic to award students each week to celebrate their success individually, by class and by year group.

Sparx provides a highly personalised weekly homework to students, tailored to their attainment level and working speed. Your child's homework will be set on Wednesday and due on Wednesday every week.

We know you want to support your child's maths progress, so we are sharing this article to explain how Sparx works and how you can help your child complete their homework each week.

What is Sparx Maths Homework?

- Sparx provides personalised homework to each child, with questions that are challenging yet achievable, and tailored to their learning needs.
- The majority of each week's homework will be based on recently learnt topics, but it will also include some questions from previous topics to help reinforce their learning.
- Students access their homework on their online Sparx account, where they'll get immediate feedback for each question about whether their answer was correct, or they need to have another try.
- While homework is accessed online, it is predominantly a written homework, and students should record their work on paper. Sparx has a "bookwork checks" system to help students form this habit.
- Every question in Sparx has a support video attached to that your child can get help independently.

How can you help your child with their homework?

- Provide a quiet space for your child to focus on their homework each week.
- Encourage them to start their homework early so they can get help from their teacher before the deadline if they get stuck. To ensure no gaps form in your child's maths knowledge, homework is not marked as complete until all of the compulsory questions have been answered correctly.
- Check the weekly email you'll get from Sparx and praise your child for starting or completing their homework. Encourage them to finish it before the deadline if they haven't already done so.
- Try not to help your child with a question until they've had a go first. It is essential they try to complete their homework independently so that Sparx can give them questions that are at the right level for them. Remember they can watch the support videos if they need to.

We hope you agree that Sparx will play an exciting and important role in growing your child's understanding, success and confidence in maths.

Year Group Focus – Year 8

Year 8 has been a year of progress and growth to date. Mrs Cronin and I inherited the year group at the end of year 7, off the year groups previous Achievement Team of Miss Butcher and Mr Bailey. Mrs Cronin and I had previously been the Achievement Team for the past two year 11 cohorts and were looking forward to working with our new group.

This academic year we have seen a steady and gradual increase in the year groups attendance which currently sits at 87.2% at the time of writing this. This is a 2% increase from last year which is encouraging and shows a readiness from many pupils that they want to attend Smith's Wood Academy and do well.

Behaviour within the year group is positive and we currently have six year 8 pupils within the top 10 as the pupils receiving the most positive house points, which is very pleasing to see, and this is a real reflection of the year group as a whole.

Attendance to extracurricular clubs and activities are popular, with a large number of the cohort accessing the facilities and clubs during lunch times and afterschool, with some pupils representing the Academy in sporting fixtures over the Academic Year.

This year we have appointed tutor representatives to speak on behalf of their tutor groups at half termly meetings, these pupils are in a position of responsibility and are pupils which we see as our future prefects in years to come. Alongside this we have appointed designated librarians, and we see a similar path for these pupils.

New to Smith's Wood Academy this year is the introduction of the Duke of Edinburgh which shall be led by Miss Weightman, tutor for 8C. Year 8 have had the most successful acceptances to this award, which the pupils are to undertake in their own time alongside Academy staff. We are proud of them and wish them all the best on the most of rewarding extracurricular programmes to undertake whilst at school.

Finally, on Thursday 7th March 2024 we had the multinational company of JCB come to work with the Year 8's during careers week. This was a very rewarding day where pupils worked in teams for the day to design and pitch a machine for the future. Our winning group shall be travelling to Doncaster later in the year to represent the Academy in the National finals, where once again we wish them well.

Subject Focus – Geography

Geography at KS3

This year at KS3 we have been studying a range of topics. Year 9 have enjoyed being able to link Geography and History together through the topic of Trade Routes before taking a deep dive into China and understanding the implications of the well known One Child Policy. Several debates have been held on this topic and students have really developed their oracy skills throughout this.

Year 8 students have enjoyed studying earthquakes and looking at the impacts of earthquakes and volcanoes in different locations of the world. They have taken a dive into Africa and have started to understand how vast the world is. Our African topic has shown students the reality of civil wars, the slave trade and refugees and has given students a chance to really understand how different people live.

Year 7 students have had their first experience of Geography for many of them, beginning the year by looking at continents and oceans and studying our impact on the oceans by looking at plastic pollution. Students were able to careful consider their individual impact and many made pledges to reduce their waste moving forwards. Students are just finishing their second topic this year on extreme weather, having studied a variety of different weather systems and shown off their learning in a well completed Celebration of Learning.

Geography at KS4

Geography at KS4 takes an interleaved approach, often completing a couple of lessons on one topic before linking this to another. Students in Year 10 have looked at Climate Change, Tropical Storms, Development, Rio de Janeiro and Rivers. They have made links between topics – understanding how development has influenced the impact of tropical storms, how climate change can influence rivers and how Rio de Janeiro is a city of two halves.

Students in Year 11 have taken the time this year to look at biomes in detail – studying tropical rainforests and hot deserts with both their challenges and opportunities. They have been able to link this back to development from their Year 10 studies before moving on to look at coastal landscapes. The final topic for Year 11s looks at earthquakes. Again, students will understand how development will alter the impact of this by comparing two earthquakes occurring in Nepal and Japan.

We have also been offering both year 10 and Year 11 intervention throughout this year which has been well attended by both year groups. We are very proud of how our KS4 students have taken ownership of their learning by attending these additional sessions and cannot wait to see them thrive in their exams at the end of the year.

Geography Homework

At KS3 students are expected to read the article provided to them before answering 5 questions relating to the article. Each article has been carefully selected to support the literacy of our students alongside their in class learning.

At KS4 students are expected to complete the GCSE Pod assignment set each week as well as a revision flashcard that will support their revision at the end of the year.

Subject Focus – History

History at KS3

At KS3, students study History chronologically beginning with the Norman Conquest in Year 7, culminating with WWII in Year 9. It gives our historians the opportunity to explore the world of British history and adds challenge as the years go on by studying history in the wider world.

Presently, our Year 7 historians are delving into the fascinating world of the Tudors and exploring the temperamental personality of King Henry VIII. Not only is he an interesting King from British history but made huge changes to the English church which are still felt to this day.

Our Year 8 historians are exploring the important, complex and highly relevant topic of British democracy. From having looked at the living conditions of Britons in the Industrial Era, they are now considering how the men and women fought for their right to vote.

Our Year 9 historians have now chosen their options and are experiencing a taste of what GCSE History might hold. They studied the Holocaust last half term with great sensitivity and thoughtfulness, and they are now looking at the wider context of the time by delving into the turning points of WWII. They have explored sources from Dunkirk and formulated opinions on how much of a success this was for Britain.

Our KS3 historians are doing a great job of investigating the past- keep it up!

History at KS4

Our Year 10 historians have made a fantastic start to their GCSE journey and continue to work hard to show dedication to their chosen subject. In the last term they explored the theme of Health in Britain and how and why we have gotten healthier over time. This is a huge study which spans the length of over 1000 years! Currently, Year 10 students are studying the politics and key events of the First World War. They are exploring the relationships between European Powers in the build up to the war and following this they will be looking at the war itself.

Year 11 are working hard towards their final GCSE exams- not long now! They have nearly completed their course and are currently exploring the world of Norman England and the impact the Normans had on the life of the English population. Students will finish this unit- and their GCSE course- with a site study on Norman Wales.

History Homework

At KS3, students are expected to either carry out reading tasks and answer accompanying questions, or complete research tasks to supplement their classroom learning.

At GCSE, student homework involved revision of past learning through either GCSE Pod tasks or reading tasks with questions to answer.
